What will you find?

SPLASHPOINT LEISURE CENTRE: A 25m long marine mural showcasing local marine species painted by two renowned street artists from London, Jane Laurie and Frankie Strand. A volunteer will share more details on the day.

EAST BEACH: Visit the fishermen and find out about the traditional methods of net making. They will be on the beach in front of Coast Café sharing their skills on how to make nylon fishing nets that are commonly used on small scale fishing boats.

FISH FACTORY: A 5m long canvas retelling the heritage of the fisheries industry in Worthing.

WORTHING PIER: A multimedia exhibition of the family history of Worthing's longstanding fishing families. Listen to interviews we did with fishermen and boat builders, and ask our volunteer for more information.

ST PAUL'S CAFÉ: A review of the community engagement work over the past 18 months including a pop-up museum, a mini fish market and a number of fish filleting and fish cookery classes. Talk to our volunteer at the venue to find out more.

WORTHING LIBRARY: An exclusive insight into the collections of newspaper cuttings and photographs covering the local fisheries heritage from the 1800s until today.

WORTHING MUSEUM: Lifeboat display which is related to the fishing community and fishing families.

WEST END GALLERY: Printed canvasses showcasing the most prominent Worthing fishing industry photographs will be on display alongside resident artists Sarah Sepe, Barry Williams and guest artist Georgia Yiapanis. The gallery's theme this weekend is all about the sea and maritime industries with 10% of the proceeds from sales donated to The Last Fisherman Standing project. Fishy colouring sheets will be available for children who join the trail.

Welcome to the final exhibition of the Last Fisherman Standing, a Heritage Lottery funded project celebrating the rich history of Worthing's fishing industry from the 1800s until today.

WHAT HAVE WE ACHIEVED IN THE LAST 18 MONTHS...

- We have had the great honour of recording interviews with prominent members of the fishing families in our town
- Set up a pop-up museum on the beach
- Run a mini fish market as well as a series of fish cookery and fish BBQ events
- Rebuilt an old wooden fishing boat with volunteers
- We engaged hundreds of school children learning more about the life of our fishermen and the challenges they face today
- We screened the award winning 'Last Fisherman' film in Christ Church, Worthing's fishermen's church, with over 200 guests listening to the Worthing Sea Shanty Singers celebrating life at sea
- We closed Worthing's first film festival 'Films on the Gallery Wall' by sharing seaweed snacks and the 'Last Fisherman' tale once more.

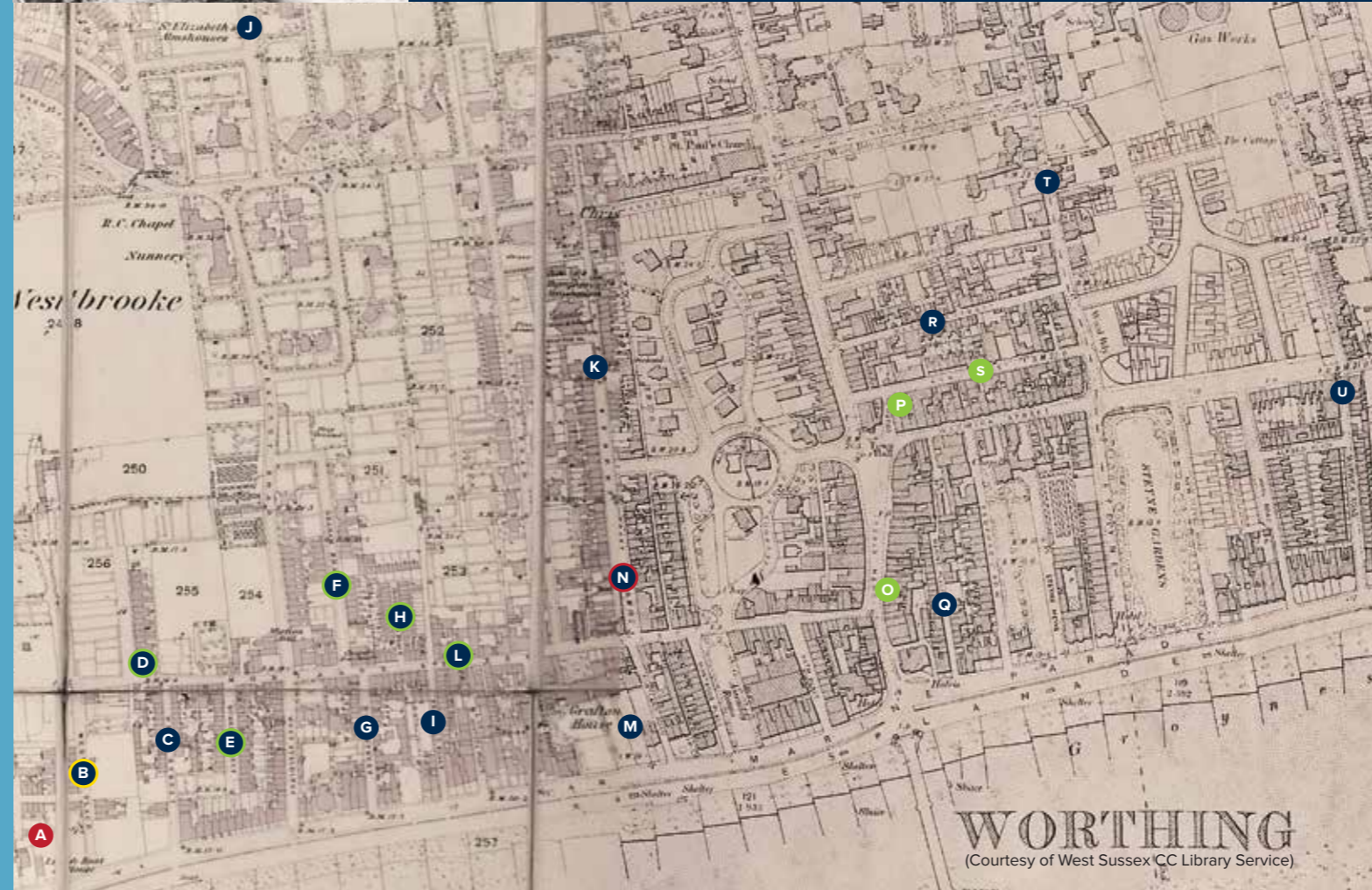
